



A Word on Evangelism by Debbie Kemp

Chalmers Church Evangelists

Recently I asked someone who was wearing a cross necklace if they went to Church. "No, all they do is ask for money. Sure I believe in God, but I am a good person." This brought back to my mind a comment made by Dorothy Henderson, our facilitator at the Visioning Day. She said that most people are not against God, they are just indifferent. (paraphrasing R. Bibby a researcher on faith in Canada).

Only a couple of times have I been asked "How does your belief in Christ make a difference in how you live your life?" Those times were in Rev John's sermons (and he did not require us to answer out loud). None of my non-Christian friends have ever asked me this. If they did I hope that I would not stammer. I think I'd say something simple like "He's helped me through rough times." What would you say?

There is a term called Relational Evangelism. It is about letting the light of Christ come through in our friendships, our relationships with our neighbours, family, work and school colleagues. This is much easier and harder at the same time. It is easier because we already interact with these people. Harder because these people also see us at our worst – when we are angry, discouraged or say something that we shouldn't. But I also think that seeing us 'warts and all' helps people realize that faith is a journey, and that you don't have to already have it all together to start that journey. They may not be asking you "how does your faith make a difference", but they are watching to figure this out. We may be called on to have an important conversation about our faith sometimes, but our actions do speak louder than words.

Guess what, we are all evangelists.
